

Kick off summer at the Maple Lake **Makers & Growers International Control of States and States an**

It's been said that for a small town, Maple Lake has a lot to offer. That reputation is due in part to three large events that annually attract thousands of people to town. – The Gearhead Get Together, the St. Patrick's Day festival and the Ice Fishing Contest. The newly formed Small Business Group has added a fourth big event that will have people oohing and aahing over the ingenuity of this small town all over again.

Starting on May 21 and continuing one Sunday out of every month through October, downtown Maple Lake will play host to the Makers and Growers Market. Fine artisans and local growers will set up their wares under tents lined back-toback down Birch Avenue from Pagel Law to Star Street starting at 10:30 a.m. until 3:30 p.m. Already the group has 30 unique vendors lined up for the first event.

"We're going to flood the streets with booths; it's gonna be like Gearhead all over again," said Denise Blizil, one of the event's organizers.

The whole concept of the market is to draw attention to Maple Lake's small yet unique and varied business community and attract more creative businesses to the area, said organizer Scott Chant-

land.

"It's been phenomenal the reaction we are getting from this," said Blizil. "It's going to be a carnival."

In addition to the 30 plus vendors, there will be live music from the acoustic trio, Shotgun Mafia, yard games, children's crafts and face painting and an assortment of food trucks including Debbie Wurm's T-bomb trailer, the Pork Chop Guys, Sara Liebecklce's Cream Machine plus mini-doughnuts, shaved ice, cheese curds and corn dogs. The Maple Lake Lions will also be on hand with grilled burgers and fries.

To meet their big goals, this first year the group decided to wave admission fee for vendors. Instead, they are asking for a donation of an item \$25 or more in value which the group will auction off at a fundraising event next February. There is also no admission for shoppers.

So far, the group's plan has worked beautifully, attracting a diverse selection of high- quality local vendors. Here are a few samples to whet your appetite:

· The Simple Gourmet out of Saint Michael aims to make it easy for everyone to become a great cook with flavorful, convenient, high quality and unique products from seasoning mixes including steak butter and seasoned sour cream to the fan-favorite Overnight Oats. Made with organic, glutenfree, sprouted oats, organic chia and flax seeds, and organic, freeze-dried fruit, Overnight Oats have a shelf life around five months and comes in a variety of flavors such as blueberry muffin, apple pie and French silk pie. Most are also gluten-free.

• The Butchery of Maple Lake is a hometown favorite known for its fresh cuts, award winning smoked meats.

in Minnesota, Smail said. Opening the event to fine artisans and local growers gives them many more options.

Makers and Growers is a subcommittee of the Small Business Group newly formed last fall under the Maple Lake Chamber of Commerce to create new events, and support already established events with the goal of boosting Maple Lake's economy. For instance, next winter they hope to support and expand The Chamber's Christmas in Maple Lake by adding a vintage snowmobile show.

The Small Business Group meets monthly and currently has about 20 members. Its underlying goal is to encourage conversation between the small businesses in the community and exchange ideas. Its official mission statement is: To promote the growth and the strength of small businesses by creating an inviting businesss friendly environment while working with all Maple Lake businesses, the Maple Lake Chamber, City Hall and the community as a whole.

it's worth doing, it's worth doing well. That's the philosophy of the Kingsbury family in Maple Lake.

Kenyon, who graduated from Maple Lake High School in 2022, was the student who always made the most elaborate dioramas and amazing baking soda volcanoes.

"Once we were supposed to draw a totem pole, and we actually carved it out of wood," she said.

"We," of course is her family, because when it comes to anything hands on and creative it's always a group effort.

"We all get into it," her mom, Janine said.

Kenyon, along with her mom, and dad, Rick, are natural crafters. They can make feathers out of old denim jeans, jewelry out of old belt buckles and bracelets out of the belts. Rick has a knack for refurbishing old table lamps and lamp posts into solar powered garden lights.

Over the years, their crafts have drawn the attention of friends and neighbors, which encouraged them to dream a little bigger. This summer, they will sell their wares at Minnesota's largest seasonal outdoor market, the Wright County Swappers Meet.

"We don't make a lot of money at this, we just enjoy seeing other people enjoy what we made," Rick said.

Their new entrepreneurship all started last summer with the opening of Trails End T, a business venture of Kenyon and Janine's that has them selling Herbalife brand healthy beverages on the go from a converted horse trailer. Wanting to drum up more business for their new endeavor, the family decided to pursue a spot at the Swappers Meet, a summerlong market just west of Annandale that attracts 150 to 200 sellers on Saturdays and 350-plus on holiday weekends. And it wasn't easy getting in. Initially, there

was another Herbalife seller at the meet and with limited spacing, swap meet organizers decided they only wanted one, Rick said. The Kingsburys lucked out when shortly-there-after the Herbalife dealer decided to move on, and the family was in a position to move right in.

It turned out the 30 by 30-foot space they were given was too much for the little trailer so they asked if they could also sell some of their crafts. Now they are glad they did because they've become quite popular. Among the items they sell are belt buckle necklaces, hand-made earrings, bracelets and keychains made out of belts, decorative denim feathers and homemade paper infused with wildflower seeds that can actually be planted and grown after use. The majority of the Kingsbury's crafts have a decidedly western feel and have been popular with men and women alike.

Kenyon has even taken to making custom jewelry orders onsite. She lets the customer pick out a buckle and all the embellishments and puts it together right in front of them. It puts a little more pressure on Kenyon who recalled one customer last summer who really challenged her with a design. Usually able to crank out her creations relatively quickly, this one took a bit longer. The customer decided to walk around the outdoor market to pass the time, Kenyon recalled. But by the end of the second lap, Kenyon had made just what the customer wanted.

"And they think it's really cool to see it being made," she said.

Kenyon came up with the belt buckle necklace idea back when she was in 4-H. That first beltbuckle necklace got her to the State Fair. She's always been interested in repurposing old treasures. It started when she found a bag of antique bottle caps and turned them into earrings. Her parents think along the same lines. When Kenyon was younger, she and her mom often made decorative jars, occasion cards and whatever else came to mind. If they find something laying around with no apparent purpose and it looks intriguing, they will figure out a way to put it to good use.

Rick became interested in solar lighting when Janine asked him to make a gnome house out of a stump in their yard. Like every project this family undertakes, it became more elaborate, until he not only had a tiny house, he had a tiny house with a tiny window lit by solar power. That led him to want to figure out how to use solar to light more parts of his yard. Eventually he started collecting old lamps and lamp posts that he took the wiring out of and replaced with solar lighting. His solar powered lamps are great for the outdoors because they don't need electricity and they give off just enough light to see by, but not enough to attract swarms of mosquitos, he said.

While each Kingsbury has their own niche, they all help each other out. It's a true family endeavor, and above all, it's fun, they said.

The Kingsburys expect to be at the Wright County Swappers Meet most weekends and holidays.

This year's event will take place, Sunday, May 21.

The making of Pioneer Park

The historic moving of the Soo Line Train Depot down Highway 55 in 1972 was the first piece of a puzzle that, over the next five years, saw rapid growth. The park board at that time had at their disposal a sizeable piece of land along Highway 55 that the Village of Annandale offered to lease to them for \$1 per year. Known as the Ridgeway Farm, this is where they brought the depot and the many buildings that followed. On the property already were three buildings that were part of the original farm – the granary, barn, and farmhouse.

From that point, construction of the park as it is known today began to move forward rapidly. In 1974, the park acquired the 1901 Albion Township schoolhouse that had been used to teach students until 1970. In 1975, the 1886 French Lake church was moved onto the grounds and around that same time the Corinna Township Hall, built in 1892, was moved to Pioneer Village. Pioneer Village was a large undertaking all on its own. From 1977 to 1978 volunteers worked tirelessly to build a historically accurate main street scene with nearly a dozen businesses authentic to the times and a wooden boardwalk that ran the length of them. Old buildings were brought in for use as replicas of the barbershop, 1917 dental office and 1886 post office, lawyers office, buggy shop, and undertaker parlor.

By the late 1970s, construction of a sod house/claim shanty replica was finished, and the park had acquired the 1884 Anton Sorensen Log Cabin from Foley and reconstructed it on site. At that time the maple syrup operation in the new Maple Syrup Shack had begun. Work had also begun on the two level Big Woods and Museum which would house Native American artifacts loaned by Harvey Hawkinson, rock collections and much more given by Shadduck and other donors. In 2015 this is where the Gordon Memorial Research Library was established.

In 2017, volunteers from Annandale, Maple Lake and South Haven worked together to build and furnish the firehall in Pioneer Village. Many artifacts from the Maple Lake Fire Department can be found here including authentic gas masks, gear and a fire hose wagon used in the late 1920s and 1930s to haul hoses to the fire site. The building itself is a remarkable feat of volunteerism. Spearheaded by Jim Dearing, retired owner of Dearing Construction and Tom Neu of Maple Lake Lumber, the hall was constructed in one day using volunteer labor. According to a description of the event written by then Park President Ed Skomoroh, a group of about 25 workers went to action at 7 a.m. and by 3:30 that afternoon everything was complete except for the front façade because they had run out of lumber. Skomoroh wrote, "it reminded me of when early settlers would get together to raise a barn."

Preserving history

Over the years, the park has held a variety of events to raise money and grow the knowledge of Central Minnesota's past, but its biggest accomplishment remains the many school children who come through the park as part of school tours. Before COVID hit, the park easily hosted 1,000 children a year.

A proud past

Minnesota Pioneer Park has a proud history and looks forward to an equally distinguished future. Summer at the Ball Park in Maple Lake



After a long, snowy winter, nothing is more welcoming than a warm evening at the baseball park. Maple Lake's amateur club, the Lakers kick off their season this weekend, on Saturday, May 6 at 6 p.m. in Mora. Their first league home game set for Friday, May 12 against Montrose/Waverly.

Since the early 20th century, town ball has held a spot in the history and heart of Maple Lake. With one of the best amateur baseball parks in the state, no shortage of community support, and a winning program with 20-state tournament appearances since 1975, the Lakers are a source of pride and entertainment.

2023 outlook

The 2023 squad returns a core of talented players including one of the best pitching staffs in the League in long-time ace Mitch Wurm, Ben Reilley, Nick Preisinger, Grant Mergen and Hunter Malachek. Last year, Malachek had 57 innings pitched, a 7-1 win/loss record, 72 strike outs, and a 1.74 earned run average for the fourth-best pitching stats in the league.

The pitching staff should see plenty of run support from a hard-hitting team led by Reilley, Donnie Mavencamp, Matt Bergstrom, Ben Clapp, and Ben Goelz.

Maple Lake is part of the North Star League, a deep and competitive group made up of 12 teams: the Buffalo Bulldogs, Cokato Kernels, D-C Saints, Delano A's, Howard Lake Orphans, Hutchinson Huskies, Litchfield Blues, Loretto Larks, Maple Lake Lakers, Maple Plain Diamond Devils, Rockford Crows and Waverly/Montrose Stingers.

Lakers Manager Casey Pack expects Hutchinson and Delano to be at the top of the pack with Litchfield not far behind with a lot of young talent and a competitive pitching staff. Last year, Litchfield's Avery Liestman was second in the league in pitching with a 1.59 earned run average. Hutchinson pitcher, Z. Kuseske, was third with 1.74 (He had just one more win than Malachek).

The Lakers finished the North Star League playoffs last year as the fourth seed from Region 12 and advanced to the state tournament where they were knocked out in round one by a close, one-run (9-8) loss to the Stark Longhorns.

"We're looking forward to another great season, and the goal is always to make the state tournament," Pack said.

The 2022 season marks the 20th time the Lakers have qualified for the state tournament. The highlight of those years was 2012 when they won the state title, the first for the team since 1939. That was also the year of a total remodel at Irish Stadium for the 2013 Class C Championship which Maple Lake was chosen to host. Maple Lake played host to the prestigious event again in 2019, further tightening the bond between baseball and the community. This year's state event will be the

100th. Delano, Dassel and Litchfield are hosting.

A highlight of the 2022 Laker season includes longtime player, manager, and volunteer Dale Decker's acceptance into the MN Baseball Hall of Fame. He joined former Laker Manager Gary Porter who was inducted in 2013.

A distinguished past

Townball has been around in Maple Lake since the early 1900s and even back then saw

no shortage of success.

In 1916, the Lakers won their first league championship. In 1925, they attended their first state tournament, losing 4-0 to White Bear Lake. In 1931 the Lakers won their first state championship, then won another in 1939. That same year the team advanced to the national tournament in Battle Creek, MI as the smallest community represented, and the last Minnesota team to play there.

In 1947 the Maple Lake players again won their way to the state tournament but lost to Chaska 1-0. The first home game played in a stadium at its current site was on July 24, 1950. Since that first state appearance in 1925, the Lakers went to state seven more times in 1931, 1932, 1933, 1934, 1936, 1939 and 1947. In 1958 the Lakers made league history by becoming the first team to win the regular season championship and the league championship.

In 1965 a lack of players, money problems and rising interest in the Minnesota Twins caused the Lakers to withdraw from the Northstar League. It wasn't until 1971, under coach Gary Porter, that the Lakers reorganized into the success story they are today.

Off and running

The Lakers first home game against Montrose/Waverly starts at 7 p.m. It's also free popcorn night. On Sunday, May 14 they play Delano at 1 p.m.

How much do you know about wine?

Here are some characteristics of four popular varietals.

Cabernet Sauvignon

Widely available and incredibly popular, Cabernet Sauvignons are typically bold wines that are rich in flavor. Cabernet Sauvignons are derived from a full-bodied



red grape, which is why they are often described as "full-bodied." Tannins are a naturally occurring polyphenol found in plants and seeds that are predominantly in red wines, and those in Cabernet Sauvignons are bold. Some Cabernet Sauvignons elicit tastes similar to baking spices, while others may taste more like black cherry or black currant.

Pinot Noir

Another popular, widely available varietal, Pinot Noirs boast a low tannin finish that gives them a fruity taste reminiscent of cherry or cranberry. Pinot Noirs are light-bodied and smooth.



The alcohol content in Pinot Noirs tends to be lower than that of a typical Cabernet Sauvignon.

Riesling

Rieslings are white wines that are popular thanks in large part to their sweetness and floral, citrus taste. Rieslings are a go-to option when pairing wines with certain ethnic cuisine, including Indian, Thai and Viet-



namese dishes. Some Rieslings can be dry, so wine enthusiasts looking for Rieslings for their sweetness may want to speak with a representative at the winery to ensure they're getting the wine they want.

Merlot

Another wildly popular red wine, Merlots have an extensive flavor profile. Some Merlots may produce a taste reminiscent of black cherries, while others may provide strong hints of cocoa. Merlots are typically



made in a dry style, and they are easily mistaken for Cabernet Sauvignons.

There's a state park or recreation area within 30 miles of most Minnesotans. In addition to offering popular activities such as hiking, biking, camping, swimming, skiing and birding, a variety of state park programs are open to all visitors. Programs are free, but some require pre-registration. Find state park programs online at the state parks and trails events calendar (mndnr.gov/ptcalendar). The entrance fee waiver on Free Park Days does not cover activities like camping, rentals or tours.

Minnesota Department of Resources Report

Now that the snow is gone, Minnesotans are preparing for the summer camping season. The Minnesota Department of Natural Resources has a few tips to offer that will help in planning your next outdoor adventure.

"We know Minnesotans love being outdoors, and getting outside after a long winter is exciting," said Ann Pierce, Parks and Trails Division director. "We also know time and knowledge can be barriers in planning a camping trip. We're working to alleviate this for folks by providing information to help them prepare for a fun experience." **Book campsites early, and be flexible if you can't book early**

Reservations for campsites in state parks and recreation areas can be made up to 120 days in advance. Reservations are in high demand for holiday weekends and at the most popular parks, like those on the North Shore.

If reservations are full, the DNR has three suggestions. First, sign up for the "notify me" function on the reservation website to get notified by email if there's a cancellation. Second, consider a camping trip on weekdays instead of the busy weekends if your schedule allows. Third, look for open reservations at less busy parks. Some of the DNR's favorite hidden gems are:

• Quiet is the essence of Carley State Park in southern Minnesota and is often colored with wildflowers.

• Way up north, Garden Island State Recreation Area is virtually undeveloped and remote with a quiet beach.

• Hayes Lake State Park in northwest Minnesota is so quiet, the only visitors may be you and the wildlife.

• Kilen Woods state park offers a wonderful view of the river valley from Dinosaur Ridge Overlook.

• Minnesota Valley State Recreation Area is right in the Twin Cities and offers a quiet SRA with great trails.

• Monson Lake State Park is a quiet campground perfect for a peaceful fishing, birding or hiking trip.

• At Franz Jevne State Park you can see Canada across the river.

• George Crosby-Manitou State Park offers excellent wilderness hiking and backpacking.

• John A. Latsch State Park offers scenic views of the Mississippi River Valley.

• Lake Bronson State Park is more than 356 miles from the Twin Cities, you can't get much further than that!

• Schoolcraft State park epitomizes the theme of quiet places.

• Old Mill State Park is an understated park in northwestern Minnesota that hosts beautiful historical and ecological attractions.

Looking for flexible camping options? Try camping in a state forest.

If spontaneity is your style, try camping in a state forest where all campsites are available on a first-come, first-served basis, and dispersed camping is allowed. Learn more at mndnr.gov/state_forests/camping

Buy a vehicle permit

A permit is required for each vehicle entering state parks and recreation areas. Permits can be purchased online or at park offices during open hours. The cost is \$7 per day or \$35 per year. If you're camping just one night, a one-day permit will be valid until check-out time. Find details on the Minnesota state park vehicle permit web page (mndnr.gov/permit). State forests do not require a vehicle permit.

Campfire Corn on the Cob

4 Cobs of Corn – do not husk		
Water		
1/2 to 1 cup sugar - optional		
Butter to taste		
Salt to taste - optional		

Mix the water and sugar in a clean bucket, cooler or large pan (add enough water to cover corn). Add the corn to the water mixture and soak for 1 to 2 hours. Remove the corn from the water and place over the campfire or on the grill, turning often to avoid over-burning the husk. Cook for approximately 20 to 30 minutes or until tender; remove corn from the fire. Peel back the husk and silk, spread with butter and/or salt. Enjoy steaming hot.

Pack smart

Sometimes it can be hard to figure out what to pack for a camping trip, especially for those who are new to camping. For a good starting point, the DNR has a camping supply checklist

(mndnr.gov/state_parks/stay_overnight/pa cking101).

Check equipment before you leave home

Broken tent poles or a leaky air mattress might ruin a camping trip or make it less comfortable. If your camping gear hasn't been used in a while or is new, test it at home before the trip to make sure it works.

Research events to enhance your trip

Events and programs are scheduled at state parks throughout the year, offering a wide range of activities from fishing and

birding to interpretive hikes, to crafting. Visitors of all ages are welcome, and no prior experience is needed. Find event listings on the state parks and trails event calendar (mndnr.gov/ptcalendar).

Check visitor alerts before leaving home

State park and recreation area websites post visitor alerts to communicate important information related to safety, closures, construction projects and other helpful details. Find visitor alerts by choosing a park from the state parks map

(www.dnr.state.mn.us/state_parks/map.ht ml).

Don't get lost, Smartphone Apps

The Avenza Maps app uses GPS location tracking so visitors can stay found, even off the grid. After you download the

app and a GeoPDF map, no internet or cell service is needed. DNR maps can be downloaded for free. Get details on the DNR's GeoPDF web page (mndnr.gov/geopdf).

Watch the weather

Stay in the know by enabling severe weather notifications on your smartphone. Because cell service is not available in all locations within state parks, recreation areas and forests, visitors may want to bring a weather radio to get information about severe weather warnings, watches, and advisories.

Document trip and share your photos

Make sure to bring a camera to document the great memories made on the camping trip, and remember to share. Images submitted may be featured on the Parks and Trails social media accounts. Share photos on the DNR photo sharing web page (mndnr.gov/sharephotos).
