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Maple Lake brings state title home again

Baseball fans in Maple Lake are still celebrating after the townball team, the Lakers went on an unprecedented run in September that culminated in a title clinching 6-4 victory over the Bird Island Bullfrogs at Delano in the 100th Minnesota Baseball Association State Tournament.

Bird Island became the fifth straight number one seed to fall to the third seed Maple Lake on the Lakers way to their second title in 12 years and fourth overall.

The Lakers win streak included a 3-1 win over Sartell, a 3-0 win over Jordan and an 8-6 win over Bluffton before the Labor Day finale.

Lakers Ben Clapp, Hunter Malachek, and Donnie Mavencamp produced the game's first run before James Woelfel singled in a tying run for the Bullfrogs. But a strike 'em out-throw 'em out double play by ageless Lakers catcher Matt Bergstrom prevented any more damage by Bird Island, who entered the game with a 29-4 record.



> The black and yellow increased the advantage to five runs in the sixth frame, thanks to the top of their batting order and some help from Bird Island. But the Bullfrogs would not go quietly. They chipped away at the deficit with a pair of runs in the bottom of the seventh. An error and two hits brought in the scores. But with runners on first and second with one gone, Malachek went back to within ten feet of the centerfield fence to haul in a long fly ball, then let loose a one hop bullet to Clapp at third to nail the runner from second and snuff out the

The Bullfrogs weren't done yet, though. They had the top of their order up in the ninth. Leadoff man Braeden Tersteeg hit a foul pop up down the leftfield line which Clapp raced after like a mad dog and made an astounding over-the-shoulder catch on for the first out, bringing the crowd to its feet! A base hit, a wild pitch, and a rbi grounder to short for out number two brought in a run to make it 6-4. But clean-up hitter Aiden Elfering could muster nothing but a lazy fly ball to Goelz for the final out, and the celebration was on!

Not enough can be said about the Lakers' drafted pitchers, and the championship game was a prime example. Young 17-year-old Aiden Smith from the Rockford Crows pitched a strong, gutsy 6.1 innings of two-run ball, giving up just six hits and two walks while striking out three. He was replaced by Jordan Flick

of Dassel-Cokato, who once again pitched superbly as he closed out a game for the third time in the tourney. Flick also shutout the hard-hitting Jordan Brewers on Sunday. Also, Riley Greunhagen from the Cokato Kernels gave the Lakers four solid innings in game two on Sunday as the Lakers got by the Bluffton Braves, 8-6.

Malachek combined his excellent pitching with his hitting exploits to take home the tournament MVP award. He went 2-0 in three starts, and he recorded a win in relief in the Bluffton game as well. He was joined by Donnie Mavencamp, Clapp, and Flick on the all-tournament team. Clapp captured the tournament's top hitter award by batting a very robust .625 with 15 hits, nine runs batted in, and eight runs scored.

Whether it be the three aforementioned plays by Bergstrom, Malachek, and Clapp or The Lakers committed just four errors in their six games, and you could not blink or you might miss an outstanding play by them. And while the Lakers were the recipients of plenty of breaks throughout their championship run, they made those breaks work for them by combining their excellent defense with clutch hitting and superb pitching.

The exceptional job done by the host towns of Delano, Dassel, and Litchfield cannot be overlooked as a new attendance record of 28,007 was set for the three weekends. Jordan and Belle Plain are the cohosts for the 2024 state tournament.

As the summer winds down, the final Oct. 15th Makers and Growers Market in Maple Lake is gearing up to be the biggest and best yet.

All summer long this once-amonth street fair has attracted crowds of people with a large and varied selection of vendors selling everything from fine arts and unique foods to locally grown honey, produce and more.

Sunday's, Oct. 15 event should be the biggest yet, organizer Scott Chantland said. Helping to draw in the

crowds for the season's last hurrah is Maple Lake native and musician Mitch Gordon.

Gordon will be performing throughout the event, from 10:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. in the empty lot on the corner of Birch Ave and Division Street.

Gordon grew up in Maple Lake as Mitch Elsenpeter and started performing when he was just 16 years old, making it difficult but not impossible to book venues that were 21 and older.

His dad Mike Elsenpeter was his musical inspiration. A one-man-band, Mike plays

the concertina and it's like having a five-piece band playing behind him, Gordon said. Mike favors country western and old-time music and he passed that love down to his son. Gordon is known for playing a mix of cover songs from Merle Haggard and Buck Owens to Brooks and Dunn. He'll even play a Luke Combs song, he said.

Making the play-list at every concert are also some of his home-grown originals like the purely country and always popular "Beer Joint" which debuted on his album "Better Place." Gordon has released three studio albums in all. The other two are called "Top Shelf," and "All In." He also has two singles, "One Go Around" and "The River."

Gordon has spent the last decade touring and putting on shows at big venues like Winstock, Lakes Jam and the Gear-Head Get Together.

The Makers and Growers Market kicked off its inaugural season on Sunday, May 21 with 30 vendors and has grown to 50 or more.

The whole concept of the market was to draw attention to Maple Lake's small yet unique and varied business community and that's exactly what it has done. From mid-morning to late afternoon impressively large crowds of people fill the streets to see what kind of unique treasures they can find. "Blake will come in and spin around and be with people, then he's off into a corner where he'll spin all night. You can just see the freedom and you think wow, that's how you dance," said John LeBlanc President and CEO at Camp Courage in Maple Lake.

For people like Blake, camp is a place where they can be themselves and no one thinks twice about it.

Camp Courage is part of True Friends, a nonprofit agency that provides life-changing experiences that nesota State Legislature to support the construction of a new recreation center at Camp Courage.

"After more than 50 years of use, the current pool and gym can no longer support the thousands of participants we serve every year," LeBlanc said. "The new Recreation Center will provide enhanced accessible amenities for individuals of all abilities; to continually improve the experiences we provide."

Besides the weekly dances, the gymnasium is a place for campwheelchair basketball, soccer, or floor hockey. It also serves as the training camp site for the United States Power Soccer Association. This power wheelchair league has been coming to Camp Courage for the last 10 -years to take advantage of its unique, wheelchair accessible facilities. At Camp Courage, people like power soccer players don't have to worry about fitting through doors or handicap accessible restrooms. What's even better, is they can bring their families and while they train, their families enjoy a summer vacation on the lake.

Despite its many benefits, the gym at Camp Courage is 50 years old, has humidity issues from the nearby pool and in general doesn't meet the standards people have come to expect from modern facilities, LeBlanc said. The new gym is going to be twice as big as the old one with wider margins around the edge and bleachers. Right now, there is no room for spectators, LeBlanc said. The gym will have a curtain that will allow it to be divided in half so two different groups can use it at once. The stage will also be twice as big as it is now.

The pool is just as important as the gym to campers. It's warmer than a typical pool which is therapeutic. "Just this week a camper pulled me aside and was excited about telling me features that have to be part of the pool and she first started out with

the temperature of the water. Many of our campers who use wheelchairs say the warm water loosens their joints and muscles and sooths pressure sores," LeBlanc said.

The pool is used mainly by campers for social recreation, but it's also used by the larger community. Annandale Community Education has used the indoor facility for swimming lessons and retreat groups love it. "It's a great amenity people look for," LeBlanc said.

The new pool is going to be about twice as big as the current one, it will have a large zero entry area and splash pad plus a deeper area for swimmers to jump in and splash around. There will be another area for volleyball nets.

The \$10 million awarded to True Friends will go toward the total base cost of the \$16 million project that will not only provide upgraded amenities but improve overall accessibility to the 305-acre location.

True Friends has launched a capital campaign to fundraise the remaining \$6 million needed to fulfill project goals. Pending fulfilled financial goals, construction would begin the fall of 2025.

Camp Courage plays a huge role in so many people's lives. Kathy Kinish has been coming to camp for decades, ever since she was seven years old. At Camp Courage she gets to participate in activities other people take for granted.

"Here you can go horseback riding, fishing, camping, you can do a lot of things you can't do out in the world," she said. "You can have that experience of, take for instance riding a horse and either you like it, or you don't, but when you go home and your friends say hey we're going to go horseback riding this weekend. I can talk about it with them, because I've had that experience. . . . It's just a remarkable place. It's a God Given

The origins of

As Christianity spread throughout Celtic regions and blended with other rituals Pope Gregory III expanded on a holiday Pope Boniface IV established to honor Christian martyrs to include all saints and martyrs. All Saints Day on November 1 commemorates the venerable saints, and All Souls Day on November 2 celebrates loved ones who went on to eternal rest. All-Hallows Eve (Halloween) was a time to pay homage to the dead. Poor children would go door to door in more affluent neighborhoods offering to say prayers for residents' deceased loved ones in exchange for some food or money. This was known as "souling," which became the basis for trick-or-treating. Later the tradition became known as "guising" in areas of Scotland, where children would go around in costumes. History.com says it is unknown when the term "trickor-treat" came into the vernacular. However, the phrase has at least been in use since 1951, when the popular "Peanuts" comics published a Halloween edition. The title "Trick or Treat" was also used on a Disney cartoon featuring Donald Duck in 1952.

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
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
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
