

The 47th annual Maple Lake St. Patrick's Day Parade drew its largest crowd in at least two years despite blustery winds, Saturday, March 16.

Although organizers were hoping for temperatures closer to what we experienced earlier in the week, the weather was certainly better than last year when a measurable amount of snow fell and the year before when the high was just 15 degrees.

Temperatures were still above average for March and sunshine was plentiful when the green took to the streets in downtown Maple Lake. The early spring-like weather attracted what organizer Nick Pawlenty estimated as thousands of people. Crowds of people, in spots rows deep lined Division Street to see the 87 units that made up this year's parade. The number of parade units was another above average turnout, Pawlenty said.

Needed documents to bring to your tax preparer in 2024

April marks a return to warm temperatures, landscapes marked by blooming foliage and perhaps even a colorful flower or two. April also signals tax season, a notion that may elicit different reactions than warmer weather and budding plants, particularly among those who do not anticipate receiving a tax refund.

According to the Internal Revenue Service, the deadline to file a 2023 tax return is Monday, April 15. Individuals who file more complicated returns or those who simply

don't have the time to file on with dependents will need to their own typically look to tax preparation professionals to ensure their returns are filed correctly and on time. As the tax deadline draws closer, taxpayers who work with tax preparation professionals can make that partnership go more smoothly by ensuring they bring along these necessary documents and details to their appointments.

· Social Security numbers: Individuals who are filing as single or jointly with a spouse will need to list the Social Security numbers of each person on the return. Taxpayers

provide the full names and Social Security numbers of each dependent as well as their own Social Security numbers.

· Identification: A copy of a form of identification, such as a driver's license or passport, also must be included in a tax return. The identification confirms a person's identity and the name on the ID provided must match the name associated with the Social Security number provided.

· Income statements: Tax preparers need a copy of each taxpayer's W-2 form, which employers must provide by the end of January. Taxpayers with more than one job must provide a W-2 from each employer. Additional income statements, such as forms indicating gambling winnings or retirement account distributions, also must be provided to the tax prep pro. Taxpayers who have such income should contact their tax preparation pro prior to their appointment

to determine which additional income form they need to file.

· Tax deduction documents: Tax deductions save taxpayers money, and taxpayers may be eligible for a range of deductions. For example, homeowners who finance their home purchases with mortgages will

receive a 1098 form from their mortgage provider each January. That form is a mortgage interest statement that can help homeowners reduce their tax obligations. Donations, student loan interest payments and college tuition costs are some additional potential deduc-

tions. Charities, student loan servicing firms and colleges or universities should provide tax deduction documents by the end of January, and taxpayers can turn these forms over to their tax preparation professional so they earn all eligible deductions.

· Receipts: Some expenses are eligible for tax deductions. Taxpayers can contact their tax preparation professional to determine if any medical bills, business expenses, charitable contributions, or additional expenses are deductible. Receipts may be required, and individuals are urged to hold on to any receipts they might be able to use to earn a tax deduction.

A SPRING-TIME TRADITION: Casing-time tradition: Casi

When the ice has vanished and the days are warming, I find myself thinking about spring crappie fishing. My wife does also as she loves to fish. For us, like many others, chasing crappies in the spring has become a tradition.

There are a number of lakes we like to target in the spring. Several are close to home and a couple are farther away. We don't get to each lake every year, but we do make a point to try several.

On this particular day, we began our search in a large back bay on one of our favorite lakes. The numerous bulrush beds and large expanse of shallow water had been pretty good to us over the years.

The expanse of the bay was both a positive and a negative. Because of the size, there were many possible locations that might hold early season crappies. They were looking for food at this time of the year and the mud bottom and decaying vegetation held a plethora of options for finding invertebrates for lunch.

Although the large size was inviting to hungry panfish, it was a bit daunting in terms of finding a spot that held a school of crappies. The fish never seemed to be in the same spot and it always took time to locate them.

The one big negative on this day was the wind. It was blowing in from the main lake and might be keeping the sun from warming the shallow water.

By sneaking around in the shallows with our trolling motor, we kept as quiet as possible. Spring fish are quite spooky in the clear, shallow water. For this reason, we also made long casts in an effort to fish far from the boat.

We were a couple of hours into the event and all we had to show for the morning were a few small bass. We opted to give up on the bay and moved to a quiet shoreline that had ample sun warming the waters.

In the clear water, we could see a very distinct inside weed line where the emerging weeds ended and a sand bottom began. This edge became our focus as we had caught early crappies in similar situations before. We were only a few casts into our move when we boated our first fish.

Although there were scattered crappies along the inside weed line, we soon learned there were more fish tight to the docks. Casting close to a dock without over doing it proved to be a challenge. However, we managed and ended up having an impressive outing.

Spring crappies are never a guarantee. Although they often frequent the same areas each year, water temperature and available food can dictate where they will be found. For this reason, anglers need to be flexible. This flexibility means fishing multiple locations or even switching lakes.

It is also important to note that

The architecture and people of St. Paul are what appealed to Maple Lake artist, Ernest Pribyl and so that is what he painted.


He documented with sure lines and strokes landmarks like the St. Paul Cathedral, Mears Park and Mickey's Diner. He painted for his own pleasure and over the years created quite a collection. In 2020 he passed away and his artwork was inherited by his daughter Jessica Elsenpeter.

This spring, Elsenpeter is loaning her father's work to the Maple Lake Library where his scenic cityscapes and colorful caricatures will be on display from March 4 to May 24th.

Butch Pribyl, as he was better known, was born on Jan. 20, 1945, in Maple Lake to Ernest and Florence Pribyl. He was raised in Maple Lake and graduated from Maple Lake High School in 1963.

He always had a knack for drawing, his sister Deb Norine said and eventually he found his calling as a draftsman in an advertisement on the inside of a matchbook cover.

"In those days, people smoked, and matches were free," Norine

recalled. "Companies advertised on the inside of the matchbook cover. A school was advertising for people to apply to become draftsmen, so, he filled it out, mailed the cover to the school, and the school sent him a test that he did and sent back. He was accepted, and then the school would



send him drawings he needed to complete and return."

He completed the course that way while living at home in Maple Lake. After passing a final test, he received his certificate to be a draftsman. His first job was at a boat company in Minneapolis, Norine said. From there he went on to draw houses, commercial buildings, and schools. Eventually he was employed at ATS & R Architects and Engineers. His last big job for ATS & R before retiring in 2005 was coordinating the construction of the Wausau East High School in Wausau, Wi.

Pribyl lived most of his adult life in the Twin Cities, including 15 years in a St. Paul high rise close to the Children's Museum. He loved wandering around the city and looking at the buildings, Elsenpeter recalled.

"He would always point out the architecture of a building and was fascinated by them," she said.

When his granddaughters earned their learners permit, he was happy to let them collect their driving hours by chauffeuring him around the metro while he looked at buildings and pointed out this and that about the design. It was the safer way to ride with grandpa, the girls often said

because he tended to be just as preoccupied by the buildings when he was driving.

Pribyl was also a pilot and a businessman. He learned to fly from Bill Mavencamp Sr for \$25 an hour at The Maple Lake Airport and together with his cousin, uncle, and father, they bought their first plane. In 1969, he purchased Salerno Bay Resort on the large peninsula on Maple Lake from Joe Urich, which he owned and operated for time. He was also a prolific traveler and "adventurer," according to his sister.

After retirement he spent his winters in Destin, Florida. He loved sunrises and would often text pictures to his family of the sun setting over the Gulf of Mexico, but it wasn't nature that inspired him to paint, it was his love of architecture.

In his collection that will be on display at the library, there are paintings of the James J Hill Library, the Ordway Center, the St. Paul Hotel Landmark and Rice Park, the Historic Hamm Building and the St. Paul Police Station to name a few.

Although not formally trained, Pribyl used his skill as an architectural draftsman to create unique images of St. Paul landmarks from a resident's perspective.

Pribyl's work will be the first of what exhibit organizer Judith Feenstra said will be a year-long effort to display the work of local artists living within the library's service area.

Pribyl's art can be viewed anytime during library hours: Monday and Friday 12-6 p.m.; Wednesday 3-6 p.m.; and Saturday 10 a.m. - 1 p.m.

Sweet steps to making your own maple syrup

Breakfast foods like pancakes or French toast just aren't the same without delicious maple syrup. But did you know that many of the syrups found in grocery stores do not contain any maple at all? Pure maple syrup is a marvel of nature and involves a multi-step process for getting this rich liquid from tree to table. For those who want to make maple syrup, now is the time to do it.

When the sap runs

Late winter and early spring are opportune times to collect sap for your own delicious maple syrup. According to the University of Minnesota Extension, sap flows when there is a rapid warming trend in early to midmorning following a night when the temperature gets below freezing.

You will gain an in-depth understanding of the history of maple syrup, laws and regulations, techniques and equipment for extracting, and processing sap for sustainability.

Which maple works best

In Minnesota, four species of maple can be used for sap production, although the Sugar maple is the most popular because of its sweet sap. According to the University of Minnesota Extension, you can also gather sap from red maple, silver maple, and boxelder, and you don't need a maple orchard to be a Sugarmaker, as maple syrup producers are called. Trees grown in yards, pastures and woodlands can all be used for maple sap production.

From tree sap to syrup

Maple syrup starts off as tree sap. Maple sap is mostly crystal-clear water that is roughly 2% sugar. The process begins with drilling a tap hole into the tree, then spouts are inserted into the holes to direct the sap into buckets or tubes that will deliver the sap to a collection container for

According to the Extension Office, you don't need a lot of equipment to produce maple syrup, but a few standard items will increase efficiency and product quality.

A drill with a 7/16-inch bit, collection spouts, spiles or taps, a collection container, a large foodgrade stainless steel boiling pan and heat source for boing down the sap are some of the items necessary. A large-scale thermometer and wool, orlon, or other types of filters for filtering finished syrup while it's hot are also necessary.

Bascom, a maple syrup producer, says maple syrup made early in the season tends to be clear and has a delicate taste. As the season progresses, the syrup becomes darker and stronger in taste.

According to the U of M Extension, sap has an average sugar concentration of 2%. At that concentration, you would need 43 gallons of sap to make 1 gallon of syrup.

Maple syrup is a product of nature. Although there is a short window of time for syrup production, the results are a sweet treat that makes breakfast, dessert, and other meals that much more


